





Daily Reading

Reading for just 15 minutes a day can make a big difference! Setting aside a short, consistent reading time at home helps children build stronger vocabulary, deepen comprehension, and develop a lifelong love of books. Whether your child is reading independently, listening to you read aloud, or sharing a story together, these daily minutes add up to meaningful growth. We encourage families to find a calm moment each day - before bed, after dinner, or whenever works best - to enjoy a book and support your child's literacy journey.

Lots of ways to read

There are many wonderful ways for children to enjoy reading, and all of them help build strong literacy skills! In addition to traditional books, families can explore audiobooks, which allow children to listen to fluent reading. Graphic novels, e-books, magazines, and rereading favorite stories all count as valuable reading experiences, too. Whether your child is curled up with a chapter book, listening to an audiobook in the car, or flicking through a comic at home, each of these options supports vocabulary growth, comprehension, and a love of stories. The key is simply spending time with text in a way that feels engaging and enjoyable.

Reading Plus

Reading Plus is an online reading programme designed to build students' fluency, comprehension, and confidence by providing texts that match each child's reading level. As students work through the programme, it adapts to their needs, offering practice with vocabulary, comprehension questions, and guided reading tasks that help improve both speed and understanding. Families can support this learning at home by setting aside regular time for children to log in, complete assigned lessons, and read the stories provided. Encouraging your child to work carefully, discuss what they've read, and celebrate their progress will help them get the most out of Reading Plus and continue growing as successful, independent readers.

Every ticket is a chance to win a **new book and a delicious hot chocolate**, or a special **bookmark prize**! The more you read, the more chances you have to win!




Robins' Current Read

Woodpeckers' Current Read


Year 1 Six Dinner Sid

Would you recommend this book to others?


Yes because it's a little bit funny, and cool because it teaches us a little bit about endangered animals.
